

Shrimp Tower – Luckett's white wine and citrus poached East Coast shrimp; accompanied by Bourbon spiked cocktail sauce and dill aioli horseradish mignonette.

Nova Scotia Cheese and Charcuterie Display – A display of local cheese, charcuterie meats, and smoked fish complemented with roasted vegetables, olive artichoke spread, sourdough bread slices, an assortment of crackers, and citrus mango chutney.


THE OLD FISH FACTORY RESTAURANT IN LUNENBURG

During our bus tour of Southern Nova Scotia's coast, we will have ample time in Lunenburg for lunch. Although there are many venues to select from, one of the most iconic restaurants in the town is the Old Fish Factory Restaurant at the wharf adjacent to the Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic. The menu has a wide variety of items – especially fresh and tasty items from the sea. One of the most traditional experiences that guests to the region typically enjoy includes lobster. Three of their most popular dishes are the Nova Scotia Seafood Chowder, the Lobster Roll, and the Whole Lobster Dinner. They have their own micro brewery – the Shipwright Brewing Company – which offers a fine selection of local beers.









HALIFAX CITADEL

The front [main] entrance/exit of The Citadel is located on the Southeast portion of the Citadel facing the Old Town Clock and Brunswick Street. Leave the Cambridge Suites Hotel – 1583 Brunswick Street – heading north on Brunswick Street toward the Old Clock Tower to arrive at the main entrance. If you take a taxi, there is an access road that will drop you off at the main entrance. The short walk takes about 10 minutes.
