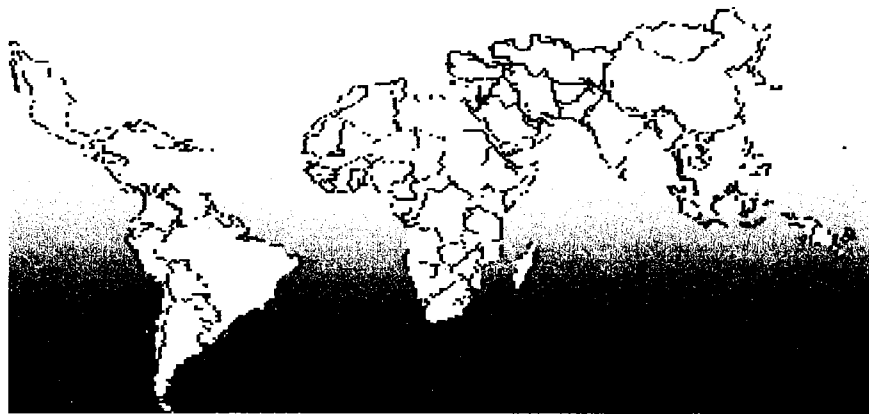

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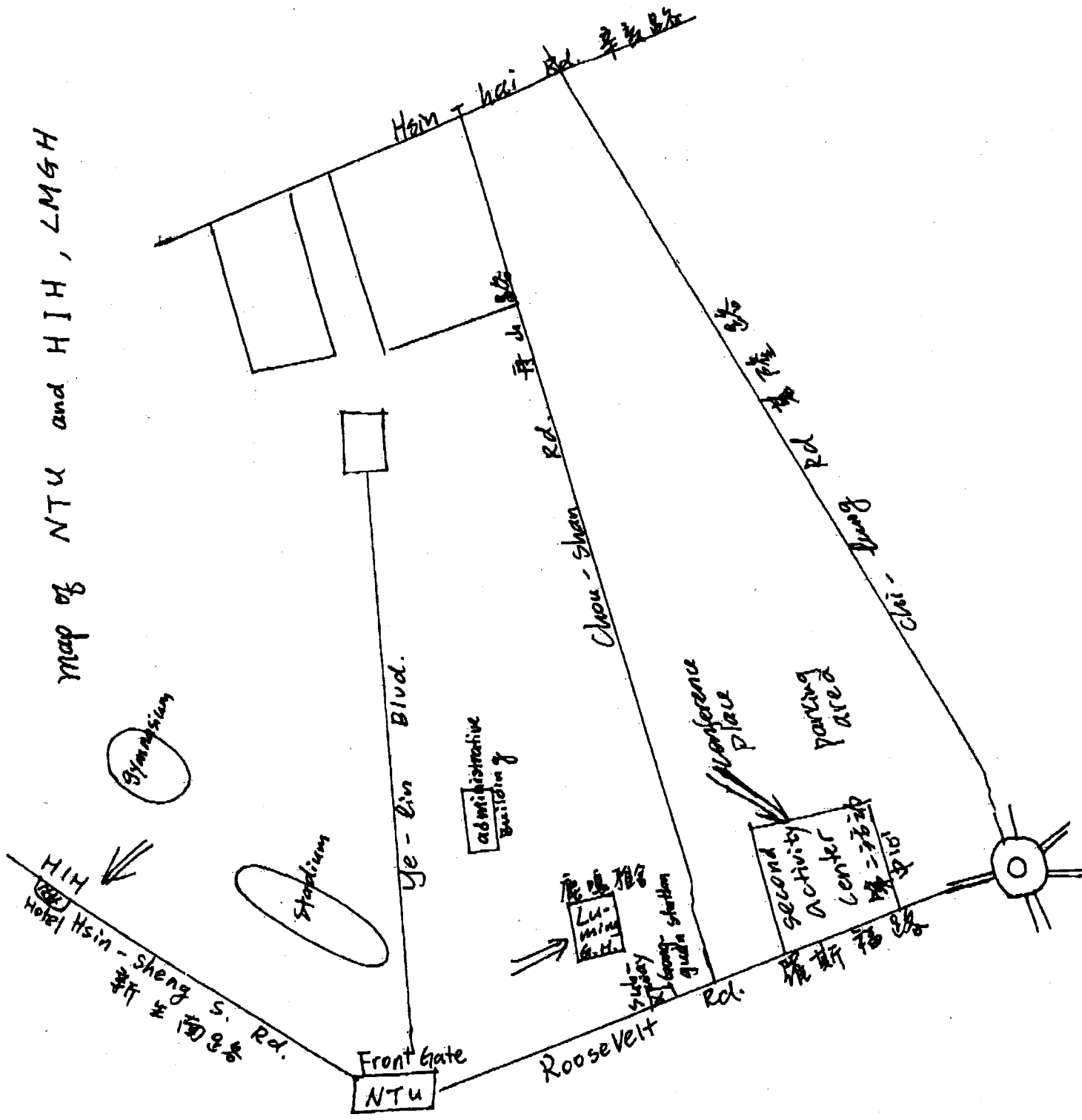
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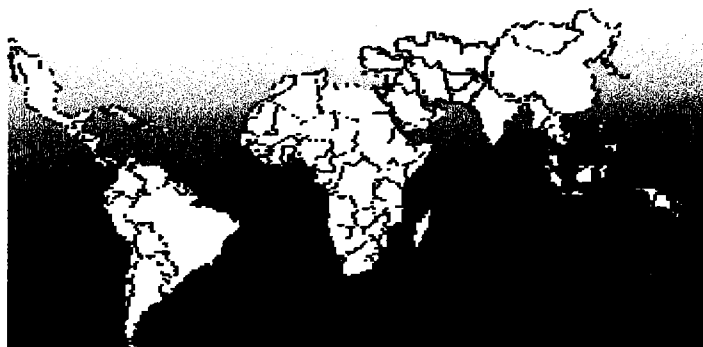
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In order to establish a structure for the organization of Third World Studies on an international scale, Dr. Harold Isaacs, Professor of History at Georgia Southwestern College, founded the Association of Third World Studies (ATWS) in 1983. The ATWS is now the largest professional organization of its kind in the world.

ATWS's first annual meeting was held on October 21, 1983, at Georgia Southwestern College with the theme being "Activities of U.S. Citizens in the Third World." The proceedings of that meeting constituted the first issue of the Association's scholarly periodical, the *Journal of Third World Studies*, published in the Fall of 1984.

From this modest beginning, the *Journal* has become a bi-annual publication of more than 350 pages per issue of peer-reviewed articles and book reviews, with a Board of Editors composed of internationally recognized scholars.

The Association's Executive Headquarters is located at the Center for International Studies, Georgia Southern University, Statesboro, Georgia.

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
