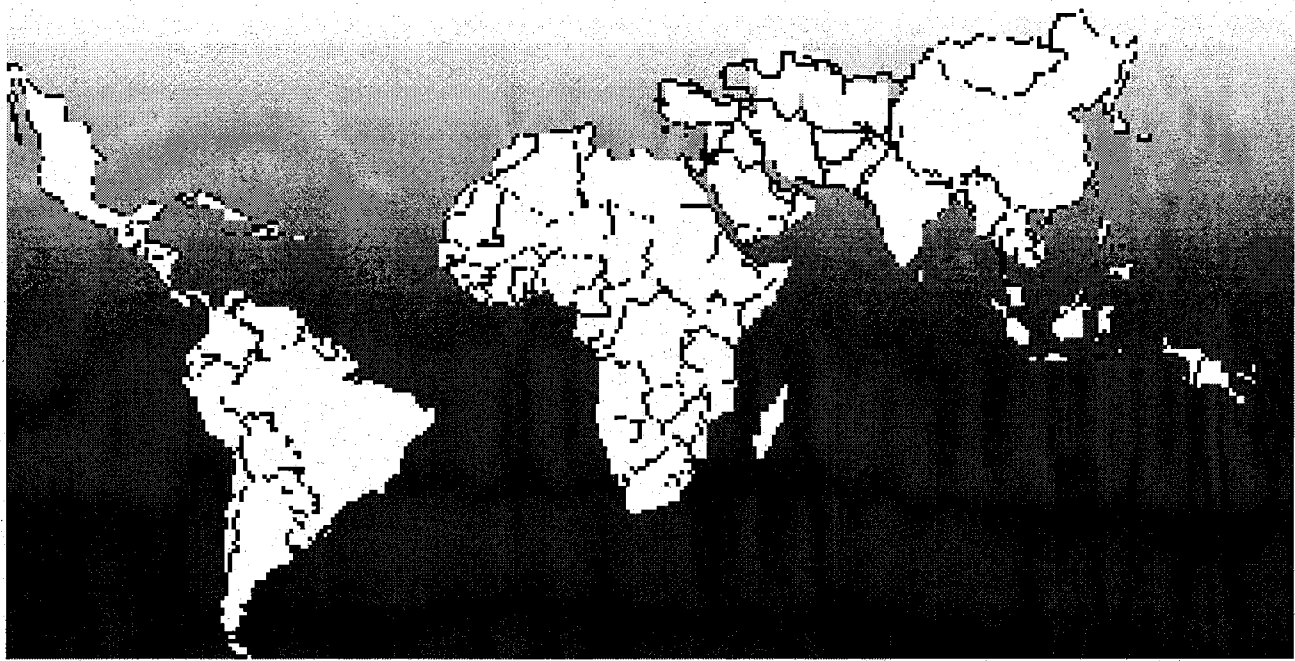

AWARDS

HAROLD ISAACS GRADUATE STUDENT AWARD

The Harold Isaacs Graduate Student Award was established in 2001 by The Association of Third World Studies (ATWS) in honor of the Association's founding president. The award is made to the top graduate student paper presented at the Association's annual meeting. Its purpose is to encourage quality research and writing in Third World studies. The winner receives a stipend. Runners up are presented with Certificates of Excellence.

The 2010 Award was presented to Melissa Williams, a graduate student at Howard University, for her excellent paper, "Free Movement of Skilled Labor Under the Caribbean Single Market with a Special Emphasis on St-Kitts-Nevis: A Vision for Unity."

REDDICK SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Named in honor of the late Lawrence Dunbar Reddick, professor of history and friend of several post-colonial African leaders, the Reddick Award is given annually to the best article to appear in the **Journal of Third World Studies** (JTWS), the flagship journal of the ATWS.

(Reddick Scholarship Award, Continued)

The award was established during the ATWS presidency of John M. Mbaku as a result of the initiative and funding provided by A.B. Assensoh and Yvette Alex-Assensoh, both of Indiana University, Bloomington. A selection committee is named each year to pick the recipient. Dr. Reddick, a prolific scholar who wrote the first authorized biography of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. (*Crusader Without Violence*), died in 1995 in New Orleans, Louisiana.

The recipient of the "Lawrence Dunbar Reddick Memorial Scholarship Award," for the best article published on Africa in the year 2010 issues of the *Journal of Third World Studies*, was George K. Kieh, Jr., Ph.D., Professor of Political Science, University of West Georgia, for his outstanding article, "Reconstituting the Neo-Colonial State in Africa," Volume 26, No.1, Spring 2009 issue of JTWS

CECIL B. CURREY BOOK AWARD

The Cecil B. Currey Book Award was established by William Head in 1997. Initially called the President's Book Award, the first recipient was Cecil B. Currey for *Victory at Any Cost: The Genius of Viet Nam's Senior General Vo Nguyen Giap* (Brassey's). Afterward, Professor Currey offered future funding for the award. In 2003 Professor Shu-hui Wu matched Professor Currey's annual funding so that the award now provides a \$500 stipend to the recipient. The Book award Selection Committee welcomes contributions to the award fund.

The recipient of the award for 2010 was Bryan Tilt, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Anthropology, Oregon State University, for his excellent study, *The Struggle for Sustainability in Rural China: Environmental Values and Civil Society*, published by Columbia University Press in 2010.

TOYIN FALOLA ATWS AFRICA BOOK AWARD

The Toyin Falola Africa Book Award, established in 2005 in honor of Toyin Falola, one of Africa's outstanding historians and intellectuals, was initially given in 2006 for the best book on Africa published in 2005-2006. The award is generously funded by Professor Falola.

The 2010 award was presented to Patrick Manning, Ph.D., Andrew W. Mellon Professor of World History, University of Pittsburgh, author of *The African Diaspora: A History Through Culture*, published by Columbia University Press in 2009.

PRESIDENTIAL AWARD

The 2010 Presidential Award was presented to Peyi Soyinka-Airewele, Ph.D., Associate Professor of International Politics at Ithaca College, in recognition of her outstanding contributions to the promotion of scholarship devoted to the Third World.
